SHARINGWORDS OF LIFE: EXPLORING LANGUAGE AND CONNECTION WITH FAWN WOOD





THIS WORKSHOP IS CREATED FOR PRE K+



Join Fawn Wood, celebrated musician and storyteller, in this engaging and interactive workshop designed for grades K-4. Through storytelling, song, and hands-on activities, Fawn introduces young learners to the beauty and importance of Indigenous languages and their connection to culture, identity, and the land.

This activity requires the following materials:

Materials:

- The Fawn Wood and puppets video
- Construction paper
- Scissors
- Glue or tape
- Markers or crayons
- Headbands (strips of paper or elastic bands)
- Printed moose antlers (attached)

As an additional piece play a <u>moose call video on YouTube</u> and have your students try to mimic the moose calls!

Lesson Steps:

- 1. Circle Time / Introduction (5-10 minutes) (before the video)
 - Begin by asking:
 - "Do you know what languages you speak at home? Did you know that many people in Canada speak Indigenous languages too?"
 - Introduce the idea of language revitalization:
 - "Some people are working really hard to learn and teach their traditional languages so that they are never forgotten."
 - Play the Fawn Wood video
- 2. Language Focus (5 minutes)
 - Write the word moswa on the board or chart paper. Say it slowly together:
 - "Let's all say it together moswa means moose in Cree!"
 - Repeat the word a few times with actions (make moose antlers with hands).
 - Talk about what qualities the moose might have; big, strong, fierce, plant eating, etc.
- 3. Craft Activity Moose Antler Headbands (15–20 minutes) Instructions:
 - Give each child a strip of paper for the headband base.
 - Have them cut out moose antlers.
 - Decorate the antlers and headbands with symbols, stickers, or designs that make them unique.
 - Help each child glue or tape the antlers to their headband.
 - Once complete, write moswa on each headband.
